Activity Descriptions:

- Using a die cut circle (brown/bronze paper) create a penny character. Add legs, feet, arms, hands, face.
- Debate: should we have pennies? (see links below)
- Research other coins. What is their value? Who/what is on the head and tail. How long have they existed? What about coins in other countries?
- Point out / share the "end matter," a common feature on non-fiction books.
