## Rules of the House By: Mac Barnett Illustrated: Matt Myers

**Synopsis:** Ian always follows the rules and his sister, Jenny, never does, but when she angers some monsters while breaking all the rules of their vacation house in the woods, Ian first runs away, then realizes there should be a rule about protecting your sister from being eaten by monsters.

## **Activity Descriptions:**

- Students will type/write up a list of 3-5 rules that are important to follow in their own homes and/or classrooms. Paste these to a piece of red construction paper that has been decorated like a door. (Activity best suited for students in grades 2-3)
- Collaborate with classroom teachers in using the red door format for establishing rules/expectations for the beginning of the year.
- Promote a classroom door-decorating contest with a "Rules of the House" theme.
