

Washington's Library Services and Technology Act: The Next Five Years

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Background

The Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) is the primary source of federal support for 123,000 libraries and 35,000 museums.

The mission is to inspire libraries

- Advance innovation
- · Lifelong learning
- · Cultural and civic engagement

IMLS' largest grant program is the Grants to States program. The Washington State Library (WSL) receives roughly \$3.3M in LSTA funding through this program each year.



LSTA Five-Year Plan

Federal legislation requires a state to have an approved LSTA Five-Year Plan in order to receive federal funding

The Plan identifies a state's library opportunities and needs

It sets forth the activities which will be implemented to meet the identified opportunities and needs supported with federal funds made available under the Library Services and Technology Act ("LSTA")

In other words the LSTA Five-Year Plan document provides the blueprint for the services WSL provides as we move forward.

The new LSTA Five-Year Plan will guide us through 2018 – 2022.

LSTA Priorities

1) expand services for learning and access to information and educational resources in a variety of formats, in all types of libraries, for individuals of all ages in order to support such individuals' needs for education, lifelong learning, workforce development, and digital literacy skills;

2) establish or enhance electronic and other linkages and improve coordination among and between libraries and entities for the purpose of improving the quality of and access to library and information services;



LSTA Priorities

 (a) provide training and professional development to enhance the skills of the current library workforce and leadership, and advance the delivery of library and information services, and

(b) enhance efforts to recruit future professionals to the field of library and information services;

4) develop public and private partnerships with other agencies and community-based organizations;

5) target library services to individuals of diverse geographic, cultural, and socioeconomic backgrounds, to individuals with disabilities, and to individuals with limited functional literacy or information skills;



LSTA Priorities

6) target library and information services to persons having difficulty using a library and to underserved urban and rural communities, including children (from birth through age 17) from families with incomes below the poverty line;

7) develop library services that provide all users access to information through local, State, regional, national, and international collaborations and networks; and

8) carry out other activities consistent with the purposes of LSTA set forth in 20 U.S.C. § 9121, as described in the SLAA's plan.

Our LSTA Five-Year Plan must be consistent with these priorities




Washington State Governor's priorities

WSL LSTA Five-Year Draft Plan Priorities

- Support library services for technology and digital literacy development in Washington communities
- Support local library staff technology competencies and learning
- Enable Washington residents to access new digital content
- Serve as a convener, enabling libraries to leverage collective knowledge
- · Align programming with goal of seeding innovation
- Build outcome-based evaluation plans into programs at their inception
