What is a Qualified Teacher-Librarian?



A qualified Teacher-Librarian is a **credentialed teacher** with specific training in how to run high-quality school library programs.

Teacher-Librarians curate collections, teach research and digital literacy, and foster curiosity through programs. They also support teachers in instruction and technology integration.

Decades of research document the student benefits of access to qualified Teacher-Librarians, including improved test scores and better college/career preparedness.

Ask who is in the library!

Funding for qualified Teacher-Librarians and library materials is part of Washington's prototypical funding model. RCW <u>28A.320.240</u> states that on-site qualified Teacher-Librarians should staff school library technology programs.

Regrettably, many districts in Washington utilize a loophole that permits them to remove school librarians and use school library funding for other purposes. This practice deprives students of the numerous documented academic and social-emotional benefits of access to qualified Teacher-Librarians.


Our students deserve access to qualified Teacher-Librarians!

More than Books!

We love books and helping kids find books they will love—but we provide so much more!

In addition to supporting literacy in the school, Qualified Teacher-Librarians:

- teach students to balance their use of technology with "real" life,
- show students how to find, evaluate, and ethically use resources.
- provide essential support to classroom teachers, especially with digital resources, lesson planning, and technology, and
- create safe spaces where all students can learn and explore.



Washington's School Library Report Card:

Washington is ranked 32nd in the nation for the student to Teacher-Librarian ratio. School library staffing in Washington has been slowly declining for over a decade. In 2019, there was a sharp drop of 10.5%. This worrying trend continued with a decrease of 31.3% in 2020, 28.9% in 2021, and 25.9% in 2022.

It's crucial that we focus on improving school library staffing for all WA students!




An Equity Issue:

Students who experience poverty, are from historically marginalized populations, or live in rural communities are least likely to have access to qualified Teacher-Librarians. However, even affluent areas like Bellevue have quietly replaced qualified Teacher-Librarians with clerks. Many schools staff libraries part-time, limiting the impact of the library program on student achievement.
