

WSL is celebrating!

- Did you know that the Washington
 State Library is 160 years old this year?
- March 2, 1853 Organic Act of March 2, 1853 provides \$5,000 for purchases of library materials;
 - May 21,1853 First shipment of books, selected by Territorial Governor, Isaac I. Stevens, leaves New York City on the clipper ship, Invincible;

From San Francisco to Olympia

- September 9, 1853 The Invincible arrives in San Francisco after 110 days at sea;
- October 5, 1853 The brig Tarquinia sails out of the Port of San Francisco, carrying the first shipment of library materials to Olympia;
 - October 23, 1853 The first shipment of books for the Territorial Library arrives in Olympia.







Library boards are ultimately responsible for assuring that federal and state laws are reflected in library policies and procedures and that the constitutional rights of individuals are protected. This chapter, although by no means comprehensive, provides a brief overview of some state and federal laws that relate to public libraries. Washington Talking Book & Braille Library (WTBBL)



That all may read ...

- Service is for anyone unable to read standard print materials:
 - Blind, visually impaired, deaf-blind;
 - Physically impaired (can't comfortably hold a book or turn pages – examples include arthritis, MS, Parkinson's, amputation, neuropathy, cerebral palsy);
 - Reading disabled (organic dysfunction examples include dyslexia and autism).

WTBBL is completely free!

- Available statewide;
- Materials are delivered via USPS directly to the requestor – WTBBL patron residences, nursing homes, hospitals, libraries;
 - Books are sent via "Free Matter for the Blind and Physically Handicapped," a federally subsidized program.

Who is eligible?

- Individuals need to be residents of Washington (only an address is needed – no proof of legal status is required);
 - Facilities such as schools, hospitals, libraries, assisted living facilities, and nursing homes, which regularly serve clients meeting eligibility requirements, may also apply for service.

Don't forget students!

- Institutional accounts are also available to schools or school districts that enroll eligible students;
- Educators can request materials for students to use in the classroom and to support student-learning needs;
 - Individual student accounts are encouraged to support learning outside of school;
 - Teachers of the visually impaired can also set up accounts for their students.

What is the application process?

- Application forms for individuals and institutions are available on the WTBBL website;
- Libraries may certify eligibility for those who are blind, have a visual impairment, are deaf-blind, or have a physical impairment;
- Only doctors of medicine or osteopathy are allowed to certify those who have a reading disability.

Books ...

- Fiction, non-fiction, westerns, mystery, romance, YA, children's, biography, classics, etc.;
- Available in Spanish and, increasingly, in other languages;
 - Available in many different formats audio (loaned with playback equipment or downloadable), braille, large print.

And more!

- WTBBL also offers:
 - Youth services, including by-mail summer reading programs and events for children and their families;
 - Reference service on issues of blindness, physical disabilities, and issues of general interest;
 - Large print deposit collections to eligible facilities.



Standard and Advanced Digital Talking Book Player

- · plays NLS digital talking books.
- plays Daisy 2.02 digital talking books, which can be found on sites such as standard Learning Ally.
- plays AMR-WB+, MP3, and WAV audiofiles.
- Both players have Power, Rewind, Play/Stop, Fast Forward, Volume (up and down), Tone (up and down), Sleep and Speed (up and down) buttons.
- The advanced has a second row of controls for setting and retrieving bookmarks and for navigating through the structured levels of a book.
- includes a variable speed control that permits speeding up or slowing down playback speed without changing the pitch.
- is portable (6 by 9 by 2 inches and weighs slightly over two pounds).
- is equipped with a rechargeable battery and an electrical cord for recharging.
- includes built-in audio instructions for using the digital player.




Books and magazines are available for download



Download Books

downloading braille and audio books. Books can be downloaded from our local and Physically Handicapped website called BARD (Braille and Audio Reading Downloads). You will use a different log-in for the WTBBL Local Audio Books and BARD website, but the download instructions are the same.

- A Digital Talking Book Machine (DTBM), which is provided by WTBBL, or a commercial audio book player (List of accepted commercial players)
- A computer with high-speed internet
- A USB storage device: This device will hold your books and will be plugged into the DTBM to play the books. There are two options that you can purchase.
 - 1. Commercial USB device: May be called a thumb drive, flash drive or travel drive. You will want a USB storage device under 16 GB that is free of preinstalled software. We cannot make recommendations on brands that will work because the products available change frequently.
 - 2. Digital Talking Book Cartridge: The cartridge is identical those that are sent from the library in the blue cases. They are designed to be used in the DTBM. You will need the cartridge and a USB extension cable to use this method. Vendors that sell blank cartridges.



Yes, there's an app

- BARD (Braille and Audio Reading Downloads) app for iPhone and iPad, released on September 26, 2013, allows users to download and read a book directly on their player;

Help for libraries

- WTBBL can:
 - Help you learn about assistive technology (AT);
- Provide information for setting up accessible work stations;
 - Give you tips on formats that can make materials accessible to your patrons who are unable or find it difficult to read standard print.

More help for libraries

- Libraries can have a digital player, book, and online BARD download account to show patrons what they can get from WTBBL;
 - Training for downloading can be provided;
 - WTBBL staff can give a presentation at your library on available services.

Spread the word!

- If you have a patron that can benefit from WTBBL's services, let them know:
 - You can keep WTBBL applications and brochures in your library;
 - You can register applicants who are blind, visually impaired, deaf-blind, or who have a physical impairment (those who are reading disabled must be certified by a medical doctor or osteopath);
 - Your library can apply for free library service from WTBBL.
