# All Aboard for Storytime: Kindergarten Readiness Training Open

Join the Washington State Library for a workshop on what children need to know before they start kindergarten and how libraries can support families so their children are ready.

Share what your library is doing and find out what libraries around Washington State are doing. Dive into the importance of intentional planning, including how Every Child Ready to Read and Supercharged storytimes can help you support kindergarten readiness in all your programs.

In this workshop you will explore how the following six domains of the Washington Inventory of Developing Skills (WaKIDS) kindergarten assessment can be integrated into storytime: (1) Literacy, (2) Language, (3) Social-emotional, (4) Math, (5) Cognitive, and (6) Physical.

You will leave with a myriad of fun ideas, activities, and booklists that you may begin using immediately. This workshop will also cover ways to share readiness information with parents, caregivers, teachers and child care providers.

## 2018 May Hill Arbuthnot Honor Lecture: "Refreshments Will Be Served – Our Lives of Reading & Writing"

The 2018 May Hill Arbuthnot Honor Lecture, "Refreshments Will Be Served - Our Lives of Reading & Writing" will be given by poet and author Naomi Shihab Nye at 7:00pm on Saturday, April 28, 2018, at the Western Washington University Performing Arts Center. Each year the Association for Library Service to Children, a Division of the American Library Association, selects an individual to prepare and deliver a paper considered to be a significant contribution to the field of children's literature. Libraries across the country apply to host the lecture and Western Washington University and Whatcom County Library System are thrilled to be selected as the 2018 host site.

The lecture is open to the public, and free of charge, though registration is requested. #### **Increase Your Emotional Intelligence**

Work that focuses on public service can be both rewarding and costly. Being mindful of our own work narrative and understanding how we deal with conflict are two key areas that require our attention. The Washington State Library presents "Self-Talk and Emotional Intelligence: Improving your Work Narrative."

Participants in this 3-hour workshop will learn how to:

- · Identify and adjust their self-talk;
- · Understand their personal work mission;

- Develop awareness of cycles of conflict; and
- Improve clarity and effectiveness of communication.
