Washington Learning Standards Review and Revision Engagement English Language Arts, Math, Science

Updated August 2024

The Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction (OSPI) engaged partners and stakeholders from across Washington's K-12 education system in the learning standards review and revision process. These partners and stakeholders may have participated in informational opportunities, provided consultation, formal or informal feedback through presentations, surveys, meetings, or attended events around the review and revision of the learning standards. The public review process, set to be open through September 13, 2024, is anticipated to amplify the opportunity for additional feedback from many critical voices in our state.
