OSPI Media Literacy Integration Grant Program Open

OSPI has a newly established media literacy grant program. This is a competitive grant program for the purpose of supporting school teams as they work to develop and share openly licensed two to four week curriculum units where media literacy or digital citizenship skills are integrated into instructional units within the areas of social studies, English language arts and health.

Most awards are anticipated to be in the \$15,000 range. Grant applications are now available on **iGrants Form Package 922**, and are due by 4:00 pm on October 21, 2019.
