

Info Session for COVID Library Relief Fund

ALA will host a free informational session on April 22 at 12 p.m. PT to accompany the **[ALA COVID Library Relief Fund](#)** application form. If you are interested in applying for a grant for your public, school or academic library, you are invited to this one-hour session. ALA will highlight the fund, the application process, and respond to questions. [Register here](#).

The ALA COVID Library Relief Fund will provide \$1.25 million to a number of public, school, academic, and tribal libraries across the U.S. and U.S Territories that have experienced substantial economic hardship due to the coronavirus pandemic. Grants between \$30,000 and \$50,000 to libraries/library systems/districts will be awarded to those that have seen a substantial reduction in funding that impacts their ability to provide essential services to under-served populations in low to moderate income groups to help re-establish, sustain, amplify or create new services for those targeted audiences.

The deadline for [applicant submissions](#) is May 20. Grants will be announced on June 23.

Native American Library Services Grants Now Available

The Institute of Museum and Library Services is now accepting applications for [Native American Library Services Enhancement grants](#). The program is designed to assist Native American tribes in improving core library services for their communities. The grant period is up to two years, and projects must begin September 1.

The #AntiracistBookfest is the first and only book festival that brings together, showcases, and celebrates the nation's leading antiracist writers and helps to prepare the writers of tomorrow. Panels are typically organized with two authors and a moderator. Additionally, there will be workshops for writers facilitated by book editors and literary agents.

The National Antiracist Book Festival is a ticketed event: \$10 per panel or \$250 for an all-access pass. Tickets will be on sale through April 21 at 1 p.m. PT.
