This is the 55th year for the state awards program, which was previously called the Governor's Writers Awards. An award is given based on the strength of the publication's literary merit, lasting importance, and overall quality to an author who is a current resident of Washington State.

Start Your Application for the Second ECF Window Sept. 28

The Federal Communications Commission <u>announced</u> that it will open a second filing window for schools and libraries to request future support from the <u>Emergency Connectivity Fund</u> (ECF) program. From Sept. 28-Oct. 13, schools and libraries can apply for funding for the upcoming school year to cover broadband and devices for students and patrons who lack home internet access at <u>emergencyconnectivityfund.org</u>.

During this new application filing window, eligible schools, libraries, and consortia of eligible schools and libraries will be able to submit requests for funding to purchase eligible equipment and services between July 1, 2021 and June 30, 2022. Survey: "What Kind of 'CRAAP' Do They Teach in High School?"

Consider participating in the following information literacy practices survey created by librarians at Bellevue College.

With the help of participants, the survey organizers hope to identify what (if any) types of source evaluation (CRAAP, SIFT, lateral reading, etc.) are being taught in Washington state middle schools and high schools. The results of this survey will allow them to determine how best to incorporate source evaluation and information literacy practices into our work, and create continuity in learning for our students.

<u>Take the survey now</u>. The survey will take approximately 15 minutes to complete. Participants who wish to remain anonymous can opt out of both including an email and providing any additional resources at the end of the survey.

Emails provided will be used to alert participants of survey progress and results, and may be added to a directory of library professionals in the state for future collaborations. **Emails/personal information will be removed from the raw data, and will NOT be used for publication purposes or presentations.**

The survey will be open until Nov. 1, 2021. The results of this survey will be analyzed and shared as a final report, and may be used in future presentations or publications.

5C Essential dialogue about serving youth in libraries

Join next month's Youth Services Critical Conversations Club (YS3C) on Oct. 14 from 10-11 a.m. PT! **Register in advance**.

In 2021, Timberland Regional Library (TRL) re-cataloged the entire picture book collection in their 27 branch shared collection. TRL staff re-cataloged over 13,000 unique picture book titles (and relabeled over 36,000 books) into 13 themes to increase browsability for patrons. In this session, project leads Alexis Hardy and Muriel Wheatley will give an overview of this project. They will discuss why the library decided to re-categorize their picture books, how they logistically went about it, how they decided what categories to include, and what the impact has been so far.
