#### WLA gains 501(c)(3) nonprofit status

The Washington Library Association (WLA) has officially shifted from a 501(c)(4) to a 501(c)(3) nonprofit. It is exempt from federal income tax under Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3).

<u>Charitable contributions</u> to WLA and the WLA Scholarship Fund are now tax deductible. As a public charity, WLA is qualified to receive tax deductible bequests, devises, transfers, or gifts under Section 2055, 2106, or 2522.

WLA will be awarding its annual scholarships later this year, for which donations are still being accepted at <u>wla.org/giving</u>.

Indigenous librarianship prioritizes the interests, practices, needs, and support of Indigenous people and can be practiced by both indigenous and non-indigenous librarians.

#### GIS-Mapping Exchange Grants Available

The <u>GIS-Mapping Exchange</u>, an Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS)funded partnership between academics, geospatial data professionals, and public libraries, is currently accepting applications for its grant program.

The goal of the Exchange is to establish an innovative training program and collaborative networking platform between public library staff, geospatial data professionals, and patrons. With support from IMLS, the program is starting a two-year project that will directly fund and support teams of librarians from around the country to partner with geospatial data professionals in their local communities and carry out a geospatial project.

Libraries that wish to play a role in this project can apply for up to \$5000 in funding to partner with local geospatial data professionals. The awards are aimed to fund projects that increase a library's capacity as a key participant in their geospatial data community.
