Invitation to Participate: IMLS National Survey -Public Library Maker Programs for Youth with Disabilities

Are you responsible for developing and delivering makerspace or making programming and services in your library? Makerspaces are flourishing in public libraries, yet little is known about the inclusive programming being provided to library patrons, especially youth with disabilities. Makerspace programming can address inequities in under-served communities (including youth with disabilities), by providing access to various making technologies, skill acquisition through training, and peer and professional mentoring, each critical to today's youth with disabilities who plan to move into the workforce, but also essential for improving each youth's quality of life.

Drs. June Abbas and Yong Ju Jung from the School of Library & Information Studies at the University of Oklahoma are conducting a national survey (funded by the Institute for Museum and Library Services) investigating the current state of programming, design, and accessibility of United States' public library makerspaces' programs for youth with disabilities. They invite you to <u>take their</u> <u>survey here</u>. The survey will take approximately 15 minutes to complete. They plan to present the results of the survey at a future ALA or PLA conference and to share their findings widely on social media and their project website.

UW Capstone Project Seeks to Provide Support for School Library

As part of their capstone project with the University of Washington iSchool, three WLA members and MLIS students are partnering with the <u>Green Hill</u> <u>Academic School Library</u> in Chehalis and project sponsor Julie Forbes to inspire support and reach the goal of purchasing 200 new books for the library. **They have reached 60 percent of their goal and need your help crossing the finish line!**

Green Hill is a library located within Washington State's <u>only fully-fenced</u> <u>maximum/medium security juvenile detention center</u>, serving young men aged 17 to 25 years old. A compilation of books requested by residents are included on the library's <u>Amazon Wishlist</u>.

Also part of the capstone project is raising awareness of the vital role that libraries and reading for pleasure play, as well as reading's particular impact on the mental health and development of growing minds in correctional facilities. Previously, Green Hill served young men between the ages of 15 and 21 years old. Through advocacy, working with elected officials, and bringing awareness to recent research, Green Hill residents helped change state law to allow juvenile offenders to stay in youth detention centers until the age of 25.
