WLA Seeking Early Learning Advisory Council Representative

Do you work with children and/or youth? Are you interested in policy development and implementation that directly impacts youth across the state? The Washington Library Association (WLA) is seeking a representative to the Early Learning Advisory Council (ELAC) of Washington State.

<u>Applications</u> are due by **Wednesday**, **April 26**, **2023**.

The ELAC Representative is:

- Appointed by the WLA President
- A non-voting, advisory position to the WLA Board
- Serves a term of two years; the incumbent may be appointed for one additional year
- A member of WLA

The Legislature created the Department of Early Learning's (DEL) Early Learning Advisory Council (ELAC) in 2007. The Council plays a pivotal role in the early learning system as an advisory body to DEL on statewide early learning issues that contribute to the ongoing efforts of building a comprehensive system of quality early learning programs and services for Washington's young children and families.

ELAC's membership reflects Washington's regional, racial, and cultural diversity and includes parents, child care providers, health/safety experts and legislators, as well as representatives of Tribal Nations, independent schools, the K-12 and higher education systems, early learning regional coalitions (Regional Advisors), and others interested continuing the creation of a statewide early learning system that helps all children realize their full potential. ELAC representatives from around the state meet regularly to advise and work with the <u>Washington State Department of Children, Youth & Families</u> to assist in policy development and implementation that assist the department in promoting alignment of private and public sector actions, objectives, and resources, so that partners can collectively ensure that all children succeed in school and life.

ELAC MEMBERSHIP REQUIREMENTS: Members serve two-year terms that expire on June 30th of the second year. ELAC meets at least six times per year; generally from 9 am to 4 pm. ELAC members are expected to attend the majority of meetings and be prepared to actively participate. Participants who volunteer in subcommittees or work groups should expect to meet outside of the regular meeting dates. Membership seats are unpaid positions, although non-governmental members may be eligible for compensation and reimbursement for travel expenses incurred while carrying out ELAC duties.

Humanities Washington Announcing Arianne True as the Next Washington State Poet Laureate

Poet Arianne True has been appointed the next Washington State Poet Laureate by Governor Jay Inslee.

A member of the Choctaw and Chickasaw nations, True has dedicated years to teaching and mentoring young poets around the Salish Sea. Arianne has received fellowships from Jack Straw Cultural Arts, Hugo House, and Artist Trust. She is an alum of Hedgebrook and the MFA program at the Institute of American Indian Arts and was recently the Seattle Repertory Theater's first Native Artist-in-Residence.

"I'm so excited to step into this role and get to meet folks all over our state for the next two years," says True. "I really believe poetry is for everyone, and I hope to help more folks see poetry as a resource that's always there for them, something that they know how to access and feel they have a right to." Join Humanities Washington and ArtsWA for "The Passing of the Laurel," a celebration of Arianne's appointment and a farewell to Rena Priest as laureate. Rena will "pass the laurel" to Arianne, and Washington poets—and former poets laureate—will read. The event will happen in-person and be also livestreamed.
