#WLA2024 Now Accepting Program Proposals!

The #WLA2024 program RFP is now open. On behalf of the conference committee, we invite you to submit a program proposal.

The 2024 conference is March 1 - 3, 2024, in Spokane, WA.

Programs relevant to all kinds of libraries are sought. Additionally:

- Pre/Post-Conference Workshops are either 3 or 4 hours in length, or all day.
- Standard conference sessions are either 45 or 75 minutes in length.
- "WLA After Dark" sessions are 45-minute evening programs that are more fun or provocative than our standard fare.
- Lightning Talks are 10-minute presentations that focus on a concept, project, or how-to.

Due to the number of proposals received, not all will be accepted. In some cases, strong proposals covering similar topics may be asked to combine into one program to provide varying perspectives on the topic and to ensure that we have room on the schedule for diverse offerings. Program Coordinators may suggest alternative presentation opportunities, such as panel discussions, lightning talks, or poster sessions, to allow for as much engagement and collaboration as possible at the conference.

Proposals are due no later than **November 1, 2023.** Applicants will be notified of their proposal status by **December 1, 2023**.

IMLS Nourishing Minds Initiative

Is teen mental health something you are thinking about? Would you like to gain skills in building positive teen well-being? As a part of the <u>IMLS-funded</u> *Nourishing Minds* initiative, The Seattle Public Library is seeking six U.S. public libraries to participate in a series of activities over the next year that will give library staff the opportunity to:

- Build strategies for proactively creating services in support of teen mental health
- Move away from a crisis approach to teen mental health
- Attend a series of participatory design training sessions and build skills in support of teen mental health
- Receive coaching from Meridian Library District (ID) and Charles County Public Library (MD) staff
- Facilitate a programming series in support of teen mental health and library space that support teen mental health

Those selected to participate will receive a \$6000 stipend to use in support of learning about and providing services in support of teen mental health.

Onboarding of selected library staff begins in November 2023, learning sessions for selected staff will begin in early 2024, and libraries selected will facilitate their mental health centered programs from February through July 2024.

Latest milestone for project "GLAM" Assists Cultural Heritage Institutions

BATON ROUGE – Cultural heritage institutions, including galleries, libraries, archives and museums, or GLAMs, are being impacted by climate change. About 56 percent of these institutions reported increased damage to collections due to water or moisture between 2017-2019. Of that damage, about 10 percent was the result of natural disasters. As storm season ramps up in the south, LSU researchers reached a significant milestone in a research project aimed at assisting our nation's historical/natural/scientific/cultural collections remain safe and intact.

Over the past year, the collaborative **Providing Risk of The Environment's Changing Climate Threats for Galleries, Libraries, Archives & Museums (PROTECCT-GLAM)** research team compiled and verified a unique dataset, including the georeferences for the majority of U.S. Galleries, Libraries, Archives and Museums (GLAMs). The original data sources included the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS), the National Center for Education Statistics, the Archives RepoData project, and the Department of Defense.

After compiling the source data, the PROTECCT-GLAM project team employed over 35 undergraduate and graduate students to manually verify and update physical location of the GLAMs. The resulting dataset includes nearly 74,000 entries and represents the first known directory of all U.S. GLAM locations. The dataset is freely available for use via the LSU Digital Commons and accessible on the project website: <u>http://protecct-glam.lsu.edu</u>. The PROTECCT-GLAM team also provided access to a form for GLAMs to submit feedback and revisions to the dataset which will be updated monthly through 2024 and quarterly thereafter.

Wake Up Your Musicianship for More Inclusive Storytimes

This in-person, interactive three-hour workshop fuses storytime and general music education best practices to prepare library workers to be more confident music educators and integrate more diverse and inclusive children's music into programming for their communities. Whether you love to sing or feel musically uneasy, this workshop will begin with interactive time to hone your skills as a musical leader. Participants will then learn to evaluate music for cultural competency and responsiveness to help patrons feel welcome and comfortable in the library. Time in breakout groups with colleagues will give participants the opportunity to practice their newfound skills.

Music from childhood can be left unexamined, either erased of its origins or left intact because 'we've always sung them.' Inclusive approaches to teaching and sharing children's music is at the forefront of the music education field, and that should be reflected in library programming for children. Music educators are at work now, rethinking how and why they choose music to teach. This program approaches that question from a library perspective. Musical skills can help library professionals to integrate diverse, and inclusive music into their programming.

With a reimagined repertoire of storytime songs, librarians become better equipped to serve their communities.
