#WLA2024 Session RFP Closes Today!

Your program belongs at #WLA2024. We have extended the deadline to submit a program proposal to today, **November 8.** If you are interested in the opportunity to bring your session to the WLA library community at our annual conference, please <u>submit your proposal</u> today.

The 2024 conference is March 1 - 3, 2024, in Spokane, WA.

Our 2024 Conference theme is **We All Belong**. Inspired by the newly adopted motto of our host city, "In Spokane, We All Belong," our theme will encourage

attendees to consider what it means to belong in a community, a library, and a professional ecosystem. How can we ensure that our libraries are not just places to access information but also safe, inclusive, and accessible spaces for all? When the future feels uncertain, what can we do to ensure resilient communities and sustainable libraries while maintaining a culture of belonging? Our Conference Committee is approaching the planning process with the idea of belonging at every step of the way, and we hope to create an environment for you to build community, grow as professionals, and bring innovative ideas back to your libraries to show we all belong.

Programs relevant to all kinds of libraries are sought. Additionally:

- Pre/Post-Conference Workshops are either 3 or 4 hours in length, or all day.
- Standard conference sessions are either 45 or 75 minutes in length.
- "WLA After Dark" sessions are 45-minute evening programs that are more fun or provocative than our standard fare.
- Lightning Talks are 10-minute presentations that focus on a concept, project, or how-to.

Due to the number of proposals received, not all will be accepted. In some cases, strong proposals covering similar topics may be asked to combine into one program to provide varying perspectives on the topic and to ensure that we have room on the schedule for diverse offerings. Program Coordinators may suggest alternative presentation opportunities, such as panel discussions, lightning talks, or poster sessions, to allow for as much engagement and collaboration as possible at the conference.

Proposals are due no later than **November 8, 2023.**Applicants will be notified of their proposal status by **December 1, 2023**.

- WCCPBA Committee strives to choose books that expose students to a wide array of books that they might not encounter on their own.
- Additional factors considered in vetting the final list include, but are not limited to: gender appeal, important themes, various genres, diversity, engaging and ease lesson implementation, quality literature, and child appeal.
- These books may be either fiction or nonfiction. Wordless books are not considered. We will not honor titles that are self-nominated.
- Titles on the final 20-book nomination list will not be reconsidered in future years.
- Books are to be in print and distributed in the United States.


