- Showcase knowledge of books or learning in research.
- Use after voting Sasquatch/WCCPBA voting to show what was memorable about a favorite title
- Book Spine Poems
- Display lots of great potential titles.
- Be aware: a mess will follow. Learning isn't neat.
- Write poem first, then gather books for the photo. Display photos, too!
- Great way to get boys involved in creating poems!
- Book Swap
- Get volunteers before starting.
